It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. - Extra swimming sessions for KS2 to be undertaken in next academic year due to unforseen increased prices of transport this academic year
- Year 5/6 children have undertaken sports leader training and facilitated activities for younger children increasing sports participation across schools
- Children have had opportunity to take part in extra curricular sports activities
- A wide range of sports undertaken beyond the national curriculum expectations

- Undertake visit to a sports stadium
- Extra swimming for children unable to swim 25m
- Further develop extra curricular sporting activities
